Safeguarding Coordinator Sharron Macrae admin.livingwaters@bne.catholic.net.au It's nice listening to the final part of this Sunday's gospel Matthew 13: 36-43, with the disciples asking Jesus in private to explain what he meant by the parables about the darnel in the field. This must have been probably the part of the three parables Jesus used in his teaching that caught their attention; perhaps the one who asked, since the gospel writer did not give the name of the questioner. Perhaps, if 'they' didn't ask for further clarification we may not have got answers. Or maybe Jesus would have found another way to explain the parables he used.

So, that courage to ask brought about the key point of this Sunday's gospel-the Son of Man (the sower), world (field), the people of the kingdom (good seeds), the work of the evil one (the darnel), etc. Unlike before when people simply do what they are told these days' people ask questions; to know what they don't know, to be sure what they have heard or read, to know when, where and what is happening or just for the reason of asking. What all of these engender towards is conversation, which often times helps to smoothen rough edges possibly on how people relate with each other, interact and live within a given community. The fruits of these processes are abounding; deepened understanding and communion, shared gifts, skills, talents, knowledge and stories, community living and care etc.

But then there are times when these engendered conversations could be unsettling, edgy and naggy and we at times feel the safest way to go about it is simply to stay away from people which of course can be most helpful but also can be most certainly lonely.

There is a wise saying that goes thus: 'no one is an island'. Now this wise saying over time has been interpreted to mean various things mostly depending on the situations it has been used. However, in whichever case it's been used, it points to the fact that the presence of the other person brings something completely new. It may not be the best, but it is different and new. Even in the parable of the Sower, the Sower needs the ground in order to sow his seeds (well, this is me transliterating the parable) but it gives an idea of that complementarity that we share within a lived community.

Well, I might have consciously moved this reflection from its focus on the WORD of God sown in our hearts when we hear it and read into community living because this Sunday we celebrate "World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly". Our Grandparents and the Elderly- nay Seniors hold a very unique place and bond in every lived community. They not only hold the history and virtue of the past, but they knit it together with the present and the future. And they share it with warmth, 'hug and hope, pray and pamper'. And so, we adore them, respect and cherish them for their undying snuggle. Thanks for never saying never.
