BEHOLD THE LAMB OF GOD

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, the gospel reading speaks about the first encounter between Jesus and his disciples. John the Baptist introduced Jesus to his disciples by these words "Behold the Lamb of God." The disciples left John the Baptist and followed Jesus. Because they recognised Jesus as the real Lamb of God whom the prophets have spoken in the Holy Scriptures.

When Abraham was about to sacrifice his only son to prove his faithfulness to God, Isaac asks a question where is the lamb? In this incident God provided the Lamb which saved the life of Isaac. On the night before the people of Israel left Egypt, they escaped the wrath of the Angel of Death because of the blood of the lamb in their house door post. After reaching the Promised Land the people commemorated this very event every year by celebrating the feast of Passover.

On important feast days the faithful brought the lambs to the temple of Jerusalem to sacrifice them for their sins. The person who was offering the sacrifice placed his hands on the lamb as a sign of transmitting his sins. The animal took the blame for the sinner and died in his place. More than a ritual the heart of the worshipper must be contrite and believing. In the New Testament, Jesus is the Lamb who dies for us and since his sacrifice is perfect there is no need for animal sacrifices. We recite the words of John the Baptist three times during the celebration of the Eucharist "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world" John 1: 29.

In the book of Samuel, we read about the special call of Prophet Samuel. The elderly priest Eli helped Samuel to recognize God's voice in his life. In our churches the sanctuary lab reminds us of the presence of Jesus in the form of the Eucharist. There was an eternal flame near the Ark of the Covenant in the Jerusalem temple. It reminded the people of the everlasting presence of God in their midst. The boy Samuel was sleeping there to make sure that it did not run out of Oil. At night, he heard someone calling him and thought it was the priest Eli. After repeated calls Eli understood that God was calling him and asked him to say "Speak Lord for your servant is listening." Later on Samuel became the faithful servant of God and is considered one of the greatest prophets of Israel.

In the gospel story, Jesus invited the disciples to come and stay with before becoming his disciple. After staying with him they became convinced that he was truly the Messiah. Our Christian life is a spiritual journey with Jesus. He invites each one of us to live with Him. In order to become His disciples the joy of Christian life depends solely on our personal relationship with Jesus. There are many people in our families and in our neighbourhood who might need our help to meet Jesus in their lives. We must use every chance to witness Christ so that many people may encounter Jesus through us. Let us accept His personal invitation and renew our friendship with Christ so that we can give many people the opportunity to have a fresh and living encounter with Jesus. Let us also be in touch with Jesus so that we may be able to touch and transform others.

NEWS FROM THE PARISH OFFICE





Potatoes, Eggs, and Coffee Beans

Once upon a time a daughter complained to her father that her life was miserable and that she didn't know how she was going to make it. She was tired of fighting and struggling all the time. It seemed just as one problem was solved, another one soon followed.

Her father took her to the kitchen. He filled three pots with water and placed each on a high fire. Once the three pots began to boil, he placed potatoes in one pot, eggs in the second pot, and ground coffee beans in the third pot.

He then let them sit and boil, without saying a word to his daughter. The daughter, moaned and impatiently waited, wondering what he was doing.
